# Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise



**T**wo events occurred in Lynn Bondurant's life when he was 12 years old that changed his life forever. The first was when he joined the church and began his journey with Christ. The second occurred on the night of September 24<sup>th</sup> when he saw his first eclipse of the Moon.

For the past 50 plus years Lynn has remained very active in his church work. He has been a Sunday school teacher, junior high youth advisor, twice served as a Presbyterian elder, was a member of Mission Council, served as chair for the Presbytery's *Partnership in Christ Campaign*,

and in 2006 served as Moderator of the Presbytery of the Western Reserve.

In 2008 Lynn was the recipient of the Daniel W. Martin Science as a Christian Vocation Award from the Presbyterian Association on Science, Technology, and the Christian Faith. He and his wife Kay are members of John Knox in North Olmsted.

Lynn's love of the study of space eventually led him to work at NASA. He has worked at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland and the Glenn Research Center here in Cleveland. Lynn also helped to create the National Air and Space Museum in Washington D.C. Following the Challenger accident Lynn was on loan from NASA to help the families of the Challenger astronauts create the Challenger Center for Space Science Education. Lynn retired from NASA in 1999 but has remained active in doing many aerospace educational programs.

During his illustrated presentation Lynn will take us on his faith journey that touches the stars.

## The Dance of Southwest Flight 3227

As Southwest Flight 3227 took off from Tampa International Airport on August 8 at 8:15 p.m. I glanced out my window viewing a mildly interesting sunset. It was framed in gray clouds and a few cumulus clouds were silhouetted near the horizon. The whole sunset seemed far away, as if looking through a gray cavern.

Gaining altitude the cumulus clouds receded and the colors intensified. As we ascended, I wondered, could we catch a glimpse of the descending sun? No.

Going through the first layer of clouds I considered the show over. To my surprise coming out of the clouds we were greeted by the sunset, sandwiched between two layers of clouds. The silhouetted cumulus clouds had vanished and the colors in the sky brightened even more sending light back toward us through the gray cavern.

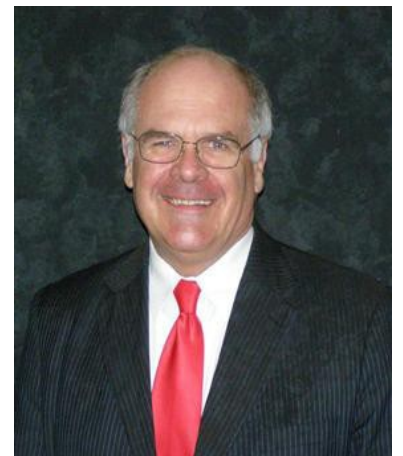
Climbing through the second layer of clouds I wondered what would happen next? Emerging from the clouds we were greeted by an orange red band that traveled the horizon lighting feather like clouds over the Gulf of Mexico. Jets flying closer to Sun were painting the sky with their contrails. Over my shoulder I could see the sole bright evening star (Venus) shining in a sky that was changing from topaz blue to deep dark blues and purples.

What more could happen? Flying at 39,000 feet Southwest Flight 3227 was invited to dance with creation. To our front on the left was our first and possibly closest partner, a thunderstorm cloud that topped out around our height. She had a lot of energy and spark. Her beauty was displayed by flashing inner lights. As we slid around her left side her gown was illumined by a pearl, translucent light. Somehow the edge of the sunset was reflecting its light back on the north side of her gown. We danced with two or three other energetic partners gaining altitude to 41,000 feet.

Approaching Columbus the evening star tired and began to drop below the horizon. As it left the dance floor it glowed red, blinking on and off through the lower atmosphere as it said goodnight.

As we twisted and turned making our approach to land the evening moon joined us for the last dance moving under the cowling of the engine and around the tip of the wing. We were whirling and twirling around the moon as we prepared to land.

Just before landing I looked down to earth and saw a fireworks display celebrating who knows what. This was not an amateur production. Looking down the multiple bursts of the grand finale seemed small and blended in with city lights. However, an observer on earth looking up would have been awed by the display.

# MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



## The Story of a Heritage Presbyterian Church Member

*Nearly 16 years ago, the Isenberg family shared this story with the members of what was then Northminster Presbyterian Church. The members of our church played an important role in what happened.*

**F**ive minutes! How could I possibly decide the fate of my newborn son in just five minutes?

The whole day had been a blur. Exhausted from delivering a seven-pound, fifteen-ounce baby boy, I was dazed ever since I'd learned that he was not the healthy baby I had expected to have. My husband Jeff and I quickly chose a name for our child; the Catholic hospital we delivered in had insisted on baptizing him before transferring him to Rainbow Babies and Children's Hospital. The words "in case he doesn't make it" hung silently in the air.

Soon, the doctor at Rainbow Babies and Children's Hospital was patiently explaining to us that Doug suffered from Patent Ductus Arteriosus or PDA. Blood that should travel through his lungs went directly to his heart. This is how a fetus breathes in the uterus, but when Doug was born, the natural lung maturation didn't take place. Doug, three weeks premature, believed that I was still breathing for him.

Doug also suffered from Respiratory Distress Syndrome or RDS. He turned blue several times in his first twenty-four hours of life and his lungs worked harder and harder with each breath. A typical infant breathes 40 times a minute, while Doug was already taking in 120 short breaths each minute. Even with all the technology available, these babies often do not survive. The combination of PDA and RDS was deadly.


The pediatric doctor needed to know within five minutes if we would allow Doug to participate in a study involving a new, untried method of treatment-and we didn't know what to do. Luckily, our minister showed up then to help us pray and decide. This was the first of many things that our friends at Northminster did to help us through this difficult time. We decided to participate in the study and Doug was assigned to the aggressive treatment method currently used in the United States.

Most people didn't even mention Doug's birth to me. Because he was so ill, people acted as though he didn't exist. On the first Sunday after his birth, though, our friends at Northminster placed a single red rose in our sanctuary, celebrating and validating his life.

Doug lived on a respirator with IVs attached to his arms, feet and head. Extremely sensitive to any outside stimuli, a washcloth continually covered his eyes and plugs blocked all sound from his ears. He was medicated to the point of total paralysis, as any movement would cause him to go into a crisis state. The doctor told me that Doug's heart beat faster whenever I was near him, so he somehow was recognizing me. Forbidden to touch him or even talk to him, as he might recognize our voices, we relied on all the prayers of Northminster.

**D**oug couldn't even eat intravenously, because he needed every ounce of strength just to breathe. His blood gasses were tested every half hour with an umbilical catheter and he was on blood thinner, plus morphine to fight the pain. Doug became extremely bloated and he developed pneumonia. He was jaundiced and loaded with dangerous medications, which could cause blindness, deafness or kidney failure in such a young child.

Doug required blood transfusions and the only one in our family who had his blood type was my sister. She was 9 months pregnant and anemic, so she wasn't allowed to donate. Several people from Northminster, though, volunteered to donate as much blood as needed.

Calls flooded our family's home and cards were sent by church members. We needed every bit of encouragement, too, because Doug wasn't responding to treatment. A nurse who belonged to our church kept us to date on medical information on PDA and RDS, which also helped. Not knowing information can be very frightening. The next time I saw Doug's doctor, his face was grim. "I wish I could smile when I see you," he said, "but I can't." Unfortunately, their best efforts weren't working.

After much deliberation and prayer, Doug was then switched to the experimental treatment.


Instead of the aggressive method they were using, Doug was gently encouraged to breathe. By this point, I felt as though Doug's chances were slipping away and I was afraid to even hope. But, under the care of seven qualified doctors and excellent twenty-four-hour nursing care, Doug started to improve!

We still experienced many setbacks. Doug developed blood clots that traveled to his heart and kidneys and he had very high blood pressure. Nevertheless, we began to have hope and the doctor was encouraging us to hang on and keep believing. "Don't give up now," the doctor now told us, "Doug is going to make it."

Member of Northminster began calling Doug "our Doug" and we didn't feel as alone during his struggle-and, on the exact day that Doug was due to be born, he began breathing on his own! That day, his doctor literally yelled, "I'm smiling!"

Doug recovered from the pneumonia with no side effects from the medicine. His liver and kidneys function normally and the PDA resolved itself through maturation. Doug remained on blood pressure medicine, but the doctor explained that he was now over the mountain—he just needed to get over a few more hills.

He was weaned off the respirator and morphine, slowly but successfully, and it was time to meet with his doctor again. I'd had my hopes dashed so many times during this past month that I didn't really comprehend what the doctor was saying to us. He was smiling as he said, "I don't think you understand me. I'm wondering what Doug will be wearing home..."

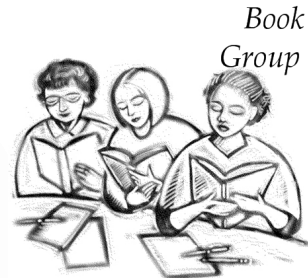

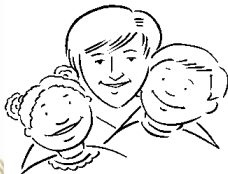

AT HERITAGE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH -

(Instructor: Dr. Malcolm Peel,

Former Wallace M. Alston Professor of Bible at Agnes Scott College / Atlanta, Georgia)

During five Sunday mornings from 9:00 - 10:00 A.M., Dr. Peel will lead a study of the unique "*Portraits of the Master*," of Christ, as painted in their Gospels by the Four Evangelists (Matthew, Mark, Luke, John). The study will take up such issues as what is a New Testament "Gospel," why four were written, how - literarily - they are related to one another, and what distinctive images of Jesus are presented by the Evangelists as authors and theologians. We shall also ponder why the Early Church insisted that only these four Gospels be kept in the New Testament canon, resisting all attempts to weave them into one or to add still other gospels which were circulating. Syllabi and take-home study questions will enhance learning.

Above all, this study will offer insight into the minds and hearts of the earliest Christians as they sought to answer Jesus' pivotal question to his disciples: **"Who do you say that I am?"** Participants will be encouraged to reflect profoundly on how this variety of Christ images both enrich and challenge our own faith.

Fourth Session: (October 19) -- "Luke: The Man for Others in the Middle of Time"  
Fifth Session: (Nov. 2) -- "John: The Word of God made Flesh"

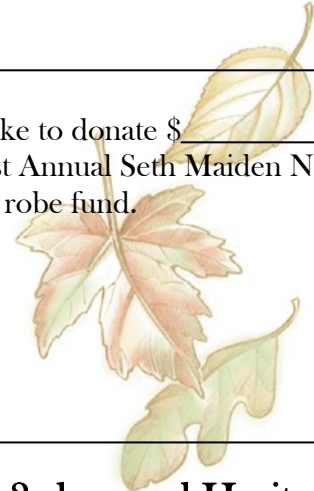

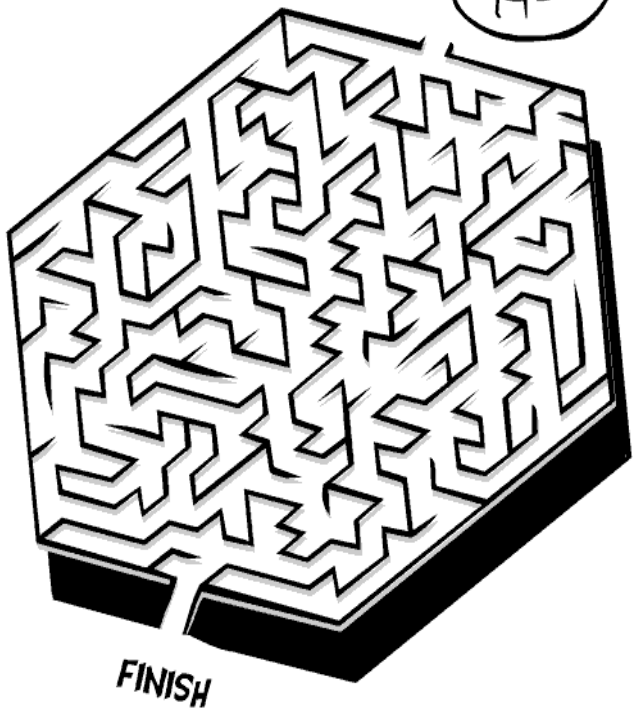
